M2J5 Works

Although detailed in the National Highways section within The Observer there are important changes being implemented this month that we believe are worth repeating.

As many of you will have seen, a new section of road has been created from the M2J5 roundabout towards the Oad St turnoff. Overnight on the 12th April NH plan to close the existing southbound carriageway along with the bottom Oad St and when the road reopens the following morning, the new section of road will be used by all traffic heading towards Maidstone. Whilst the junction of Oad St and the A249 will also reopen on the morning of the 13th, it will no longer be possible to use the centre reservation crossover in order to access the roundabout, instead all traffic leaving Oad St will need to head south towards Maidstone and use either Church Hill (to perform a u-turn) or carry on to the M20J7 roundabout.

These significant changes to the southbound traffic flow will no doubt cause confusion, particularly to those drivers who ignore the signage and road markings, therefore please exercise extreme caution when heading south from the roundabout over the next few weeks.

The northbound A249 will be shut between the M20J7 and M2J5 roundabouts between 8pm 11th April and 5am 12th April. Whilst the crossovers, including the one into Church Hill should remain open (subject to confirmation by NH) there will be no access to Church Hill from the northbound carriageway.

Additionally, Chestnut Street will be closed from Wormdale Hill to the Stockbury roundabout from the 22nd April until 19th June. This will allow the integration of the new link road between Maidstone Road and Oad Street to be completed and become useable.

Although whilst this work is undertaken, the official NH diversion is via Key Street, it is likely to result in increased traffic along Bull Lane and Church Hill as drivers seek an alternate route.

M2 junction 5 Stockbury interchange improvement scheme

Work is progressing well and we're now preparing to move the southbound traffic onto the new Oad Street link while we carry out work on the A249 carriageway.

Upcoming closures

- **9pm Tuesday 11 April to 5am Wednesday 12 April:**

The A249 northbound (towards Sheppey) between the M20 junction 7 and Stockbury roundabout will be closed overnight while we install a new temporary barrier.

- **9pm Wednesday 12 April to 5am Thursday 13 April:**

The A249 southbound (towards Maidstone) between Stockbury roundabout and M20 junction 7 will be closed overnight while we are carrying out line painting and move traffic to the new link road.

Oad Street will be fully closed between Pett Lane and the A249 and the westbound (London bound) exit on to M2 junction 5 will also be closed overnight.

When the road opens on Thursday 13 April, southbound traffic will use the new Oad Street link – just follow the signs. There will be no right turn from the Oad Street junction on to the A249. To join the northbound carriageway from Oad Street, turn left, go to M20 junction 7, where you can get onto the A249 northbound.

Mick Bingham – Stockbury Dog Club

March 2023 marked the 30th Anniversary of the founding of Stockbury Dog Club by Stockbury village legend Mick Bingham.

In 1993 Ann Ballard approached Mick, who is now our Patron to help with the training of her 5 month old German Shepherd puppies and suggested that they formed a training club, which Mick agreed to do on the condition that the club fees were donated to Hearing Dogs for Deaf People and so Ann made a trip around the local vets to advertise our existence and the club started with just one or two people turning up.

During 2004 it was decided that instead of donating all clubs fees to just one charity, we would make donations to a range of local animal charities.

Throughout this time, since 1993, the club has raised over £40,000 that has been distributed to animal charities based mostly in Kent.

The Club has changed venues over the years but settled on the playing fields behind the Memorial Hall in 2013.

We have now grown from that original handful of people to over 90 registered members with an average 40 members training every Sunday and have trained a countless 1,000's of dogs in this time.

I personally joined the Club in 2014 and since that time I cannot recall a single Sunday that Mick has not been in attendance, out in all weathers, his enthusiasm and passion for training dogs unwavering.

The Club would like to extend their heartfelt thank you to Mick, ably supported by his wife Brenda, for the dedication they have shown not only to the training of dogs but the contribution to local charities.



Stockbury Gardeners

Please accept my apologies for missing the copy deadline last month, due entirely to my pressure of work.

This month you will be able to enjoy a little more time in the garden as the clocks have been put forward and the days are getting longer which now means more daylight! However, it's not just us that notices the lengthening days, so do the plants; the first blossoms are on the trees, just to let us know spring is here.

Our last meeting was well attended, with yet more new members joining us. The now famous Rodney Gibson presented us with a fantastic talk on maintaining garden tools, but what was really interesting for us was his collection of old horticultural tools that he bought along.

There will be no evening meeting this month as a guided walk of the Hucking Estate is planned instead. We will meet on Thursday, 6th April at 3pm in the Hook & Hatchet Pub car park where Heather Lacey, a volunteer guide with the Woodland Trust, will lead the walk, which should take 2/2.5 hours.

The walk includes two or three gentle slopes and, just at the end, a steeper hill on the return to the pub (apparently, most people are happy to scale this as there are refreshments at the top!). Most of the stiles have been replaced in the last few months by kissing gates, leaving just one (optional) stile remaining. A very important thing to remember is that we finish at the Hook & Hatchet Pub as well. No matter what the weather brings, the pub serves hot soup, and cold beer! Now let's see who likes the Garden Society!

For those who look for bargains at our **annual plant sale**, the date is **29th April**. Volunteers will set up stalls at the Hall from 8am, and the sale starts 10am until 1:30 pm.

Temporary Road Closure Plum Tree Lane, Stockbury

It will be necessary to close part of Plum Tree Lane, Stockbury from **17th April 2023** with estimated completion by **21st April 2023** from the vicinity of Cherry Tree Stables, to the extent indicated by signs and barriers on site.

The closure is required while new installation works are undertaken by UK Power Networks.

Countryside Matters Hedgehogs

During March and April hedgehogs will be waking their hibernation, they will be sleepy, very thirsty and will head for the nearest water. Although good swimmers many will die in ponds because there is no way out for them.

By putting some green plastic-coated wire netting down into (not across) the pond we can provide a ladder for them to use, should they fall in.

They will also need lots of food to restore their weight after their long sleep. Putting out a dish of meat-based dog or cat food could encourage a female hedgehog to make your garden her home patch. Just think of all the slugs and snails a mother hedgehog and her family can eat in the summer months!

To stop cats eating the food place it under a shed or if you can, make a feeding station from a plastic mushroom box or a child's toy box. Cut a hole 5"x5" in one of the short sides and use this as a tunnel over the food, a brick on top should stop it being pushed aside. Later in the year if the weather is very hot and dry, extra food can be a lifesaver especially to a female raising hoglets.

Whilst the hedgehog is the gardener's friend the gardener is not always the hedgehog's friend. Many of the jobs we do in our gardens can affect and even harm them, so please take care when tidying up, pulling down sheds (a favourite nesting site) and strimming long grass and brambles. From May onwards the female hedgehogs will have their babies. Her nest can be under a shed, shrubs, brambles or piles of leaves and rubbish (waiting to be burned perhaps) or in pampas grass or even in an opened bag of compost or a bin bag. If disturbed a mother may even abandon her babies and in some cases, she may kill them.

If you should disturb a nest, call the BHPS (British Hedgehog Preservation Society) on 01584 890 801 for further advice or go to www.hedgehogs.org.uk for more information. If the nest must be removed, try to catch the mother so that the family can be kept together. And should you find a sick, injured or orphaned hedgehog BHPS will be able to give advice and details of hedgehog rehabilitators.





Patrik Says ...

For the last time Maidstone will have council elections by a third in May, before we start to have all out elections next year, with new ward boundaries too. So purdah has come around again, and yes, readers with good memories will remember that I mused last year that the term purdah is considered religiously sensitive. I note nonetheless that the term is still being used in official memoranda a year on. Although North Downs Ward will have no elections this year purdah applies to all councillors, whether up for election or not.

One of the reasons why we changed to all out elections from next year was that the six weeks leading up to the elections are always an incredibly unproductive time for councillors who become busy canvassing for votes at doorsteps rather than formulating policies and scrutinising the Executive in the Town Hall. New candidates may be forgiven for promising wonderful but unrealistic changes, while incumbents have to justify their track record for the past four years. The sad but quick lesson, which any new councillor will learn post-May, will be that we have fewer powers than one may wish. MBC is just a little District Council. For example: we can charge developers financial contributions for medical centres but we cannot train doctors nor run new GP surgeries for the NHS.

What a lot of people don't know is that GPs are independent contractors working for the NHS, they are not part of the NHS! Each practice has individual funding, calculated through a complex process of national guidelines and local negotiations. Part of the funding is a flat sum for any patient on their list, regardless of whether the patient uses the surgery often or is as fit as a fiddle and never visits. In most cases young GPs have to buy themselves into a surgery and, upon retirement, are seeking a handsome return on their initial investment when passing the surgery on to the next generation.

Until recently Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) organised the delivery of GP services in each of their local areas in England. CCGs were clinically-led groups which included all of the GP groups in their geographical area. They were recently replaced by an Integrated Care System (ICS), a statutory partnership of organisations who plan, buy and provide health and care services in their geographical area. The organisations involved include the NHS, local authorities, voluntary and charity groups, and independent care providers like GPs.

You may call me a cynic, but if part of my practice's funding is a flat sum for any patient on my books and one day I want to sell my share of the practice for good money to a junior GP, would I lobby my CCG or ICS to build more surgeries around me? Never mind how much money Maidstone's Councillors are willing and able to invest in a new medical centre?

This is only one example where I would love to change the world! Fat chance though that your local councillor can leave an impact where every Health Minister in Westminster has failed since 1948.

All of my 54 colleagues became councillors with the intention to make Maidstone a better place. I can't begrudge new candidates their promises to bring change and their enthusiasm to show the incumbents how to do it better. I will forgive new candidates for their ignorance

about what they can legally achieve and their ignorance of the powers vested in them upon election. Seven years on, I still have enthusiasm but I am a lot wiser too, with a few dents in my forehead from hitting various brick-walls.

The spine-tingling wail of air-raid sirens has become one of the defining sounds of warfare, a waxing and waning alert to imminent aerial threat. Once a familiar sound while being tested everywhere from villages to the largest cities, the UK's air-raid siren network was eventually decommissioned in 1993 at the end of the Cold War. It has taken almost three decades to develop its replacement. 'Emergency Alerts' is due for launch early this year and will deliver an urgent and distinctive siren-like sound to all mobile phones in the vicinity of a phone mast if there is a danger to life nearby. The alarm will work on any phone, with no requirement for users to register their number, and be accompanied by on-screen advice about how to stay safe. It will be used to send a direct message only where there is a risk to life, either locally or nationally.

Let's hope that we will never need to use this Emergency Alerts system for air-raid warnings, but having a civil emergencies warning system will be a useful tool for public health emergencies, severe floods, fires and industrial incidents too.

Emergency Alerts don't track your location, need your phone number, or collect personal data, and only the emergency services can send them.

On Sunday 23 April, there will be a test message sent to devices. If you receive a message, simply dismiss it. If you do not wish to receive these messages you can opt out of them in your settings, but as they are potentially life-saving, it is recommended you keep them on.
