Update

Stockbury Roundabout

Now that the Public Inquiry has been postponed until 28th April, we have a little “breathing space” to continue our discussions with Highways England and Kent County Council and to refine the Parish Council’s submission to the Inspector.

Despite some initial confusion (Highways England and the Department for Transport were both unable to tell us what was going on), we have now established that the delay to the Inquiry was caused by Highways England slightly amending their plans and having to consult on the changes.

Highways England have asked us to sign up to a “statement of common ground” in which we set out the things on which we agree and those where we have differences of opinion. Having considered their draft carefully, we have now amended it and await their response.

The Parish Council will be meeting (will have met by the time you read this) with Kent County Council on 28th February to hear how their plans to help keep us safe are getting on and hopefully, to agree a common approach in further discussions with Highways England.

On 6th March, we will be meeting with Highways England and Kent County Council in a final effort to come to an amicable solution to the problems that the overall scheme will cause for Stockbury if it goes ahead without modification. As ever, we remain hopeful that we can find a way through, but are not optimistic given that Highways England has consistently refused to acknowledge there is a problem over the last 2 years.

In the meantime, Stockbury has come under fire from a few individuals on social media and from a neighbouring MP in the press. The line being spun is that we are a bunch of NIMBYs getting in the way of further developments in Swale and perpetuating the traffic misery around the Stockbury Roundabout. In an effort to put the record straight, our consistent line is that we welcome the intention to resolve the problems caused by the current roundabout (we are victims too!), but not at the cost of the lives, businesses and community of the people of Stockbury. All we are asking for is that the scheme is amended to ensure that a community which has existed for over 1000 years continues to thrive safely.



SPC - Here to Help

Although the Parish Council is spending a lot of time working on the plans for the Stockbury Roundabout and the forthcoming Public Inquiry, Councillors are still available to help with some of the other things that matter to everyone. Recent concerns brought to us have included anti-social behaviour and reporting planning breaches.

Whilst we would always encourage people to report things themselves, we recognise that there are circumstances where you might feel this would be difficult, particularly when there is a fear of intimidation. These are exceptional cases but if you are genuinely worried, the Parish Council can step in and help.

The first step is to make contact with one of the Councillors, either by telephone or email (or nab one of us in the shop / pub!). If we can help, you will be asked to give details of the problem and to share any evidence you might have. We will then take the issue up with the relevant authority on your behalf without revealing your identity if you have asked us not to. This is not a magic way of getting things to happen but it removes the "personal" element of reporting something.

The Weather!

Because we live on an island and have a temperate climate (well we DID..... have a temperate climate), us British do tend to go on a bit about the weather. Of course now we have climate change comments and vagaries have turned into serious and meaningful discussions. BUT I'm not scribbling here to write about that. I wanted to kick in on the nostalgia front. After all we do love the white stuff, (in moderation). It covers so many garden sins!

Anyway I came across an article the other day about the most severe snowfalls we have had in the British Isles and thought some of you might like to go down memory lane. Actually I shall start a tad before that. Way back as early as 1309 the Thames froze over in the winter continuing to do so at intervals all the way to the 19th century. There were often ice floes in the estuary, playing havoc with shipping. The 'Little Ice Age' was still hanging about over Europe and the ice was thick enough to allow fairs and stalls to be set up. Londoners enjoyed the Frost Fairs as they were called, shopping, drinking, playing games and skating, all in one place. In the early 19th century Tunbridge Wells recorded a temperature of -23°C! And at Christmas 1836, after a build-up of 2 months' snow an avalanche in Lewes destroyed a row of cottages and killed 8 people.

Enough of that history; let's think back to our lifetime experiences. In 1947 From January 23rd it snowed pretty well continuously for 55 days, not stopping until March. There were fuel shortages and public services were disrupted. When the thaw came there

Skip a few years and we come to the winter of 1962 / 3 when it snowed for 3 months and the River Medway froze as did parts of the sea, (a whole mile out from Herne Bay). The Navy used an ice-breaker vessel to keep Chatham Dockyard accessible and again it wasn't until March that the thaw came.

The next severe winter was in 1987 when Sheppey saw snowdrifts of 6 metres and the temperature plummeted to -18°C; Gurkhas were drafted in to drop supplies in by air to the Isle of Grain and outlying villages in Kent.

Fast forward a few decades to 2010 when heavy snow fell on December 1st stranding 400 lorries on the M25, cancelling football matches at Priestfield where there was a foot of snow on the pitch and shutting over 100 schools.

Of course the last time we experienced huge discomfort was in 2018 when the Beast from the East came to plague us. Siberia descended at the end of February and into March.

We still have time for a short burst of the white stuff this year. I'll leave you with that thought!

Stoner by John Williams

John Williams, the American author, wrote this novel around 57 years ago and it tells the story of the life of a farmer's son who becomes a university professor.

Stoner was destined to gain a degree in agriculture but instead fell in love with English literature and followed a career as a teacher of this subject.

We read about how he is deprived of a happy marriage, how he becomes estranged from his daughter and how his career never fulfills its potential. Throughout his sad and often lonely life, Stoner remains passive and stoic, retreating into the life of literature although he does fulfill one dream in writing a book and he does have a brief, happy love affair.

This novel has many positive reviews but our group did not, in general, agree with these. We thought that the prose was stilted, that there were few descriptions and that the characters simply did not develop. Stoner annoyed some of us because he was so passive, especially in the face of his wife's behaviour and this prevented us from wanting to read to the end.

This is a "sad story about a sad man" and was not really enjoyed by our group. We gave it a score of 5.

Next month we will be reading a new title by Tom Bradby, "Secret Service".

Stockbury Gardeners

Storm Desmond, Storm Freda, what the heck does it matter, we had a storm, I am sorry but when I was kid we had rain, I used to cycle to school each day I used to get wet, trust me we had storms but we did not have such advanced warnings and our problem is now that we have too many of them. Am I a little slow here, could it be global warming? So now we cannot have wood fires and stoves, no coal fires after 2021; I can tell you now, if you live in a village where you have neither, fast broadband, main drainage, mains gas, decent digital radio, no bus service, poor intermittent power supplies, what could you possibly wish for with wood and coal being banned? There you go rant over!!

Now, this is supposed to be about gardening so here it is. I do vegetables, roses, box hedges, fruit, so I write about them but those of you who like flowers come along to our meetings this year as there are a couple of programmes if you do not "Do" veg and fruit, Steve Harmer will be giving talks on bumblebees, the restoration of Quex Park and walled garden; our own Nikki Bonner will be speaking on flower arranging, "Orchids For Beginners", plus on 5th November, "The Secret Life of the Mole", that is not forgetting the BBQ at our chairman's house.

After the above rant here is another!!! So I ran out of compost, nothing wrong with that, simple really MB Farms had not had our order for the super compost that they supply us from Humax, so Sunday 5th January off I toddled to Wickes, picked up several bags of general purpose compost and some sterilised topsoil. I duly mixed 75/25 ratio and into which I tossed some leek seeds. A few days in a controlled environment and the seeds appeared to be doing OK, 13 days to be precise. Roll on another 2 weeks and something overnight pushed a load of soil up and over the side of the seed trays and threw out some of the seedlings. Mice was my first thought! NO! It was a whole field of mushrooms and to beat that, weeds as well!!!

This month make sure that you have an automatic opener in your greenhouse as you can expect in March some really hot days; I have one but some days she goes shopping so be careful! Seriously, I have had 30 degrees registered in January so be careful, it is also an idea to ready a heater if you want to look after germinating seeds. Cucumbers can be sown this month, together with brassica (cabbage family) lettuce, tomatoes, peas, | Swiss chard, parsnips, carrot, fennel, herbs, rocket is also a great early cropper, fast as its name!

I have been experimenting with grafting tomatoes and aubergine, it's easy to do but just sounds complicated. I sow a crop of desired strain of tomato, then at the same time sow a crop of rootstock to graft onto. These seeds can be found online, however the reason for carrying out grafting onto a disease resistant and vigorous rootstock is to guarantee quality and quantity.

Once the seedlings are both about 75/90 mm high, with a clean new razor blade, cut carefully the tops off of the rootstock (estamino) and discard; then remove the tops from the desired stock and drop through a special neoprene tube placed over the rootstock stump. Do not leave too many leaves, then cover with black plastic for about a week and then remove the black plastic, only allowing partial light for the next two weeks until once again resuming full light conditions.

Please do come to our meeting on 5th March at 8 pm, all are welcome. We have Steve Harmer presenting a talk on the history of Sissinghurst Gardens.



Organ Donation Law in England is Changing

From 20 May 2020, organ donation in England will move from an 'opt in' to an 'opt out' system. You may also hear it referred to as 'Max & Keira's Law'

This means that all adults in England will be considered to have agreed to be an organ donor when they die unless they have recorded a decision not to donate or are in one of the excluded groups.

You still have a choice if you want to be an organ donor or not when you die but you need to record your decision on the NHS Organ Donor Register and its advised you also tell your family and friends what you have decided.

Dear Residents

A busy start to the year and much to report:

Garden Bins

The garden bins will continue to be emptied fortnightly for an annual charge of £40 or £36 for a smaller bin.

From **1 March 2020** the annual paper or electronic invoices will be replaced with an annual reminder email or text message with a link to the online payment portal. When a customer's next renewal is due, they will receive a final invoice via post or email (depending on their existing preferences) with a link to the new payment portal. Customers who have no other option than to pay by cash for the service can continue to do so and will be provided with an invoice which can be paid at a Pay Point.

Some Great News - Fly-Tipper Prosecuted

A Maidstone fly-tipper is to complete a 12-month Community Order after Maidstone Borough Council's Waste Crime Team prosecuted him for fly-tipping on a private driveway. Mr Paul Earwaker was prosecuted for depositing a large amount of household waste in May 2019.

Mr Earwaker committed the offence in the middle of the day while the homeowner was inside the property. The incident was caught on the homeowner's CCTV and when they realised what had happened, they reported to the Waste Crime Team who later seized the offender's vehicle and interviewed him about the offence.

In court the defendant pleaded guilty to the offence of illegally depositing waste and was handed a 12-month community order where he will have to complete 80 hours of unpaid work, undertake mandatory rehabilitation activities and pay costs of £1,310.

Maidstone Borough Councils Waste Crime Manager Jamie Duffy said: 'Maidstone will not stand for any act of fly tipping within the Borough, we take the approach to seize fly-tippers' vehicles and can sell or destroy the vehicle where possible.'

Not So Great News

Off-Street Parking Charges Will Go Up

At Committee I voted with the Conservative Group to stop this proposal, which will harm our local business and hurt rural residents who have no other option but to come to Maidstone by car. Unfortunately we lost this vote.

Planning Enforcement

There are currently two levels of priority, depending on severity. If irreparable damage is being caused and works are in progress, an officer will visit the site within two working days of receiving a report. In all other cases offending sites will be visited within 10 working days.

I previously proposed a 24/7 – 365 triage officer to follow any report immediately but there is currently not enough money for such a proposal. It would require at least

another full-time officer position. Currently I am one of a handful of lone voices calling for further strengthening of the planning enforcement team, amid rumours circulating in the corridors of Maidstone House that cuts to planning services are being considered – watch this space.

Authority-Monitoring-Report-2018-19

By law Maidstone is required to produce this report. If you are spending extended times in an airport lounge or the like and you would like to learn everything there is to know about Maidstone, you could do much worse than having a browse through this very interesting document. MBC Awarded Funds To Help Rough Sleepers

The MBC Outreach Service has been awarded £375,750 by the Government to help rough sleepers across the borough.

After receiving initial funding as part of the Rough Sleeping Initiative (RSI) in September 2018, the MBC team has been leading the way on a number of projects preventing rough sleeping and homelessness. The funds are part of a Central Government grant of £112 million which is to be shared between local authorities to help tackle rough sleeping.

Since 2018 the MBC Outreach Team has worked with 178 people to support them away from the streets into positive outcomes through a variety of ways, including social housing stock, private rent solutions, supported housing, housing first and temporary accommodation. 128 individuals were resettled.

The most recent MBC street-count, which took place in January 2020, showed that there were zero people rough-sleeping in the town centre. The local Maidstone Churches Winter Shelter only had six occupants at the time, some of whom were not local people to the borough. While I did not participate at the recent count, I personally took part at previous counts and I am confident that these numbers are as accurate as can be.

And finally

Last month I reported about a Conservative Councillors' sponsored letter to the Secretary of State. In that Maidstone asks to be given some breathing space and that the required housing numbers should not be increased before the current Local Plan ends in 2031. Indeed, the Leaders of each of our five political groups are signatories to this letter, as well as Maidstone & The Weald's MP Helen Grant. By the time the Observer went to press, I wrongly assumed that our MP and the Leader of Kent County Council were also signatories to this letter. Very unfortunate that they declined to support Maidstone's Councillors.




