The pub will be open again the weekend of Friday 30th from 5.30pm so come and join us for the last weekend in the 'old' Harrow before the pub starts it's refurbishment on Monday 3rd July. All monies raised will go into the refurbishment and improvement of The Harrow so do come along and give your support. The garden, thanks to a band of very willing volunteers looks lovely.

35 degrees Wednesday 21st June 2017water in the garden hose exceeds 55 degrees, yes that is what the water laying in a garden hose can reach, so be careful not to water plants if the hose has been sitting in the sun.

I am sitting in the garden and pondering again, that's what I do well, or so Diana informs me! Upon looking out of the window, there is a cock pheasant sounding off a warning call standing just a mere 3 meters from a fox who is picking up dropped cherries from the old trees; he seems completely oblivious to the pheasant. As quick as a flash I whipped out my iPhone camera to take a snap and the fox turned and

moved on, followed by my dog who had scaled the 5-bar gate; upon whistling she stopped and sat and looked at me! As she sat a hen moved out from the long grass who was sitting on a nest. Was the cock trying to distract the fox drawing him away from the nest? Was the fox unwell? Or was it just mutual respect? I seriously doubt the latter. BUT I have the photograph to prove that it happened!

The sSweet Pea & Rose Show held in the hall on 24th June was an immense success, the 2 judges being very complementary on the quality of the entries. Best In Show went to Penny Spearmen with a splendid vase of pastel cottage garden flowers, narrowly beating Di Spree with her entry. Best Vegetable Exhibit went to Rodney Gibson with a first class set of peas. The members before clearing up the hall were allowed to sample some of the cookery exhibits, the chairman enjoyed the samples very much. There must go out a big thank you to all that helped in setting up, running, and clearing up afterwards.

It was too late to report about The Chelsea Flower Show last month, so here is a brief resume of my visit. I am not sure on the garden that won the Best Show Exhibit, being a pile of concrete blocks with weeds growing in between! I ask you, was it modelled on the A 249? If you threw a few plastic bottles into it you would not have been able to tell the difference! Kent Highways take note. I bumped into our old friend Paulo from Franchi seeds who gave a masterly talk on seeds at our meeting in March, he was selling his excellent seeds. There were one or two stands demonstrating various eco ways of composting and usage of by products to promote soil bacteria, and electricity; not too sure I got my head around that one though! It is worth a visit if you have a chance next year.

By now you will know the great news about the pub being now in the safe hands of the village. As the opening date comes closer, keep an eye out for the window boxes and hanging baskets, these were planted by the Stockbury Gardeners in anticipation of the completion.

On the plants and vegetable side of things, please be careful in purchasing "bee friendly" flowers, it has been revealed recently that the seeds of some so-called flowers have been treated with systemic insecticide, not very bee friendly is it! I suppose the best thing is to demand from suppliers only non-treated plants.

Things to do:

- Do not put plants out too soon from the greenhouse or they can burn if not acclimatised correctly.
- Shade glasshouses with shade paint and green shade material.
- Wear a hat especially if you are lacking in top cover, a la Chairman!
- Keep plants watered and mulched.
- Use water from water butts where possible, its better for the plants as well.
- Feed citrus plants. Don't waste money with special feeds, use chem pak and read the instructions, its much better value.
- Many of you will be taking holidays soon, please ask neighbours to assist with watering plants.

The next monthly meeting has been changed to helping in the pub garden and the usual teas in the hall.

Both Rodney Gibson and I are competing at the Kent Show which is a month early this year.

NOT DEAD ENOUGH by PETER JAMES

On this occasion we decided to attend a live performance of the adaptation of the above book, before we read it and knew the ending! It was adapted for the stage by the author and we all visited the Marlowe Theatre to see it. Only then did we set about reading the longer version of the story.

Most members found the enactment engaging and entertaining ,commenting that the violent scenes were handled well and that the lead detective, played by Shane Ritchie, held the performances together. There was a difference of opinion expressed by a couple of our number, who considered that the acting did not do justice to the material and that the stage set rather hampered adequate projection. We registered the thought that perhaps the violent nature of Not Dead Enough did not translate well to the stage, however on the whole we gave it a score of 7.

When reading the book some found it hard to get started but once into the story it was an easy read, with a well woven plot. The interplay between the detective and the pathologist carried the storyline convincingly, the end twist however was rather crafty and we thought not entirely plausible. The book just pipped the stage performance scoring 7 $\frac{1}{2}$;

THE FINGERSMITH by SARAH WALTERS

Fingersmiths are petty thieves and this story, set in 1862 London, revolves round three major characters, Susan Trinder part of the thieving 'family', Mandy Lilly a 'refined' young woman living with her uncle in the country and the infamous Richard Rivers. A mean plot is hatched in part by Mrs Sucksby the matriarch of the thieves and the author unfolds this sometimes complicated plot first by writing from Susan's viewpoint and then from Maud's, finally bringing both elements together in the third part.

This is a long book and some thought the detail, though interesting, full of atmosphere and historically correct, did not advance the plot significantly and was therefore tedious at times. However the characters were multidimensional and there were good twists in the plot; for this you had to keep your wits about you, especially in the denouement.

Not everyone finished the book at this busy time of year but we decided on 7 as our score.

WHY WALK THE SAXON SHORE WAY? PART 2

Some readers may remember the first part of this late last year. Yes we did carry on and here are the results of our endeavours:

Walk 8: Halstow to Kingsferry Bridge

As I write this on a cold and rainy day in early March, the weather (in true British fashion) is worse than when we began our walks in 2016! We decided to postpone this walk until the weather was drier., needless to say we have not quite got round to retracing our tracks, so watch this space.

Walk 9: Ridham Dock to Sittingbourne

Parking under the Sheppey Crossing on the road to Ridham Dock at the end of January, doesn't sound the most auspicious start to our Saxon Shore Way walk 2017! Being the northern interloper that I am, I have no idea that there is a dock so close to Stockbury. The wind blows in off the marshes and we set off trying to sidestep the thundering lorries that go to and from the docks. Passing such places as Bedlams Bottom and Cheney Hill my research tells me that in the 18th Century sailors from many ships tried to land here, be it from prison hulks and/or ships laden with sailors with Bubonic Plague. Many men died from other reasons than the plague, since food and water were so hard to come by out on the Medway Marshes. What with the rather gruesome history and my trusty Saxon Shore Way book telling me that many old guidebooks say this area is quite unhealthy, Julia and I both conclude that the best part about the walk was Milton Country Park which was lovely. The walk ended for us at Asda car park in Sittingbourne, where the 'husband chauffeur service' was waiting – we know how to live!

Well 'Short Shorts' it is this month, so here we go:

- The sale of The Harrow Pub completed today (21st June). The Chairman of the Parish Council offered his thanks for all the hard work put in by Committee members "past and present and all the villagers for their ongoing support".
- Routine maintenance in the Orchard continues. Nettles were recently sprayed.
- The updated Parish Council website is due to be launched next month. It is hoped it will be a much improved and more up to date site.
- It is hoped that some CCTV equipment will still be available to the village to act as a deterrent to fly tipping. Our Maidstone Borough Councillor is still working to progress this.
- Outstanding planning issues are still ongoing at both Squirrels Wood and Longton Wood. Patrik Garten (MBC Counsellor) reported that Maidstone Borough Council Planning Officers are very involved here, in reaching an appropriate outcome.
- Patrik also reported that there is no news on the proposed Binbury Park development.
- He also told the meeting about a 'Love Maidstone' campaign which is to be launched, which is keen for village feedback, so keep an eye on their website if you are interested.
- Last but not least, concern was expressed about an increasing number of vehicles speeding down Church Lane and Bull Lane. It was felt this made it particularly difficult and dangerous for pedestrians, due to the lack of footpath.
