So why is the miserable old b\*\*\*\*\*d writing this time? Unfortunately, it is the same old theme: rubbish! That is not to say that exciting and positive things are not happening in the Parish (think pub?), but rubbish seems to be a perennial theme.

Summer has its benefits: warm lazy evenings with a glass of something cool, wildflowers out in abundance, even the odd outdoor meal. Unfortunately it also means that people drive around with their car windows open and jettison whatever items they feel disinclined to take home with them. It also brings another seasonal problem: a plethora of improvised signs, arrows etc directing people to houses (what exactly is a GIGYA????), or the sweating lumps of humanity running or bicycling ahead of them.

The signs should be a relatively easy matter to deal with as most are put up by people who live in the Parish or have a connection with it. The simple solution is for those who put them up to a) remember where they put them and b) take them down after whatever event they relate to. Simple? Apparently not for some......

Litter is a more intractable problem. There are still lots of people who regularly pick the litter from their adopted stretch of road, for which I am sure we are all grateful but the volume can be overwhelming. Honeycrock Hill, Hill Green Road and Bimbury Lane / Yelsted Road seem to be the "hotspots". All these are treated as through routes by people from outside Stockbury, but I suspect that there are a few local people who add to the problem. We can keep clearing up after them, but this cannot be a long term solution. Somehow we need to tackle the problem at source.

Question: has anyone ever seen someone throwing litter from their car / van / lorry? I suspect the answer is almost universally "no". If you did see it, would you know what to do?

Thanks to Patrik Garten, our Maidstone Borough Councillor, we now have a few signs warning people that CCTV is in operation specifically to catch fly tippers and those who think it is ok to throw cans, bottles, fast food wrappers etc from their cars. This might help, but is equally likely to move the problem on.

A simpler solution might just be observation. If people know they might be caught, they tend not to break the law (yes, even throwing that cigarette end out of the car is against the law!). We are all affected by the problem, so perhaps we could all be part of the solution? A Stockbury Litter Watch could well be the answer.....anyone up for trying it?

They won the top award which drew entries from all over Kent, walking off with the Society Award and The Silver Trophy that went with it. Also in the other flower and vegetable classes members took home some 11 other first prizes and several other places, not a bad showing for our members.

Also in the trophies at the show was John Chapman from Chatham who keeps his bees in Stockbury and won the top prize for the best tasting honey in the county, as a village we certainly have a high profile.

It looks as though the heatwave has broken and we are now back to the normal British summer, however do not forget to water your plants If you do mulch them with some sort of compost, always water first, there is no point in mulching dry ground as the whole point of mulching is to retain moisture.

You should be harvesting a whole lot of vegetables by now but do not forget that once you have a gap there is always the opportunity to sow a "catch crop", by that I mean a quick growing row of something such as spinach or rocket, the foodies rave about it and M&S load their sandwiches with rocket together with cheese or meat!! Rocket always puts up a good show of fast instant salad leaves, really tasty as well. Another quick crop worth trying is pak choi, if you sow it now you can eat the thinning's in a few weeks and the whole crop holds up well into the hard frosts of winter.

For those of you with hanging baskets and annuals in the garden, do not forget to dead head the plants once the flowers individually die, this will ensure that the plants continue to produce flowers right up until the first frosts.

In the garden centres keep a look out for cold stored seed potatoes, they are being sold as Christmas new potatoes. I have never grown them but will try this year by keeping them in the cold, they are chitted now and grown under cover in grow bags, I think as they are in grow bags you could move them around the garden now to the best spot and when the inevitable cold weather threatens, take them inside the greenhouse. You could if you wish, even take them to the pub with you! While on the subject of the pub, the project is making massive progress and it will be opening soon; there is a vast amount of work to do though, a lot of volunteers are working very hard to achieve the opening date.

If you wish to save some money and are prepared to invest in some of next years seeds, garden centres are clearing out old seeds and selling them at half price, there are some that are not worth buying as the shelf life is very short, however I found F1 cucumber seeds at half price with a shelf life of 4 years, so keep your eyes peeled.

This month Upchurch Society has invited Stockbury Gardeners to a farm walk in Upchurch on 2<sup>nd</sup> August, where specially bred apricots are grown under contract for Marks and Spencer.

This month at Stockbury on 3<sup>rd</sup> August, there is a forum on showing vegetables and flowers, starting at 8 pm.

I must go now as today I promised to build a hibernation hotel for the butterfly's.

We had read 'Us' by David Nicholls. This book tells the story of Douglas, Connie and their son Albie. Whether you take to a book often depends on whether or not you like the characters and/or the plot. In this case with an introverted and sometimes pedantic scientist and a somewhat more expressive, carefree and vivacious wife, it is hardly surprising that Albie has difficulty with his parents! Connie wants a divorce but wants a trip to Europe as a finalé to their marriage. Douglas who is desperate to hang on to his marriage plans the trip in meticulous detail. Albie, who at 17 is totally adolescent and intent on doing the opposite of what his father wants, causes a fair amount of chaos and heartache. What goes wrong with the trip is a large part of the book.

Most people in the group enjoyed the book and found it an easy and enjoyable read. They liked the way the characters were drawn and the way descriptions of Douglas and Connie's earlier lives, informed other parts of the plot that were based on what was happening now. Amusingly and as is always the way, some found the characters irritating and others not. The ending however met with everyone's approval – a rare event! We gave it an overall score of 8.

Next month we read 'The Mitford Girls' by Mary S. Lovell.

It is now live so log-on and take a look around for yourself. The web address is the same as before, <u>www.stockbury.org.uk</u>




