Rat Running and the Bridge

Many thanks to all of you who came along to the meeting in the Village Hall the other week. It is rare for so many people to come to an open meeting, so this obviously struck a chord. For those who were unable to attend, here is a brief summary:

Rat Running

We have experienced some dreadful problems with rat running in the Parish recently, particularly when the queue to the Stockbury Roundabout extends back to Bimbury Lane. We also have a persistent problem with people driving too fast in the lanes; this was tragically illustrated a few weeks ago when a young mother died in Yelsted Road.

The Parish Council has started working with Kent County Council in an effort to reduce both problems and we are pleased to say that KCC have taken it very seriously. As with all things, the first step is to gather evidence and you will have noticed that traffic counting strips have appeared at several junctions. These will provide KCC and the Parish Council with information on the numbers of vehicles using the lanes at different times of day and their speed. The information will be used to support a Highways Improvement Plan (HIP) which, once agreed with KCC, will be implemented. This sounds bureaucratic but it is the only way to ensure that things get done and should be relatively quick.

There are, however, some practical constraints. The lanes are subject to the national speed limit of 60 mph, so speed humps and similar are not practical unless we can get the speed limit reduced. We are advised that even if we could get a reduced speed limit (which is unlikely), the police will not enforce it.

In the short term, KCC will carry out a practical experiment. In the next few weeks, they will install temporary traffic lights in Aerodrome Approach; the idea behind this is that people trying to cut the queue to the Stockbury Roundabout will be unwilling to join a queue to get into the lanes. There is a small chance that this will just move the problem to Chalky Road but until it has been tried, we don't know.

We will keep you up to date via The Observer as things move on.

The Bridge

We have now exhausted the conventional routes for getting a bridge across the A249. I think everyone agreed that direct action like that used in the Jade's Crossing campaign is unlikely to gain us anything and will probably just succeed in losing any support we might have from KCC and our neighbouring Parishes / Boroughs. **cont'd** ...

One suggestion put forward was that if we encouraged the building of several thousand houses in and around Stockbury, the resulting income to fund infrastructure may raise enough funds to build a bridge. This would destroy the community but maybe people would think that is a price worth paying? If you think it is, please feel free to let the Parish Council know but we are assuming this is not something that many would support.

It looks like we will just have to sit back and wait for the inevitable to happen at the Church Hill junction. We know what will happen, National Highways know, Kent County Council knows but the Department for Transport chooses to ignore it.

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What the Parish Council Doesn't Do!

Although it was good to see so many people turn out to the meeting regarding the A249 and issues caused on local roads, it was a little disappointing to hear a number of people voice the opinion that, "The Parish Council do nothing". The following is just a brief summary of some of the issues and events the PC have been involved in over the past 6 months.

Road Specific

Monthly meetings with National Highways (NH, formerly called Highways England) & Graham, the contractor responsible for the ongoing A249 work, along with frequent email exchanges has:

- Discouraged NH/Graham from introducing narrow lanes on the northbound carriageway of A249 as this would further restrict the flow of traffic and consequently increase rat running.
- Resulted in the rewording and repositioning of many signs along the A249 to improve clarity and safety.
- Identified an issue with the "automated" emails that NH should be sending whenever an update was made to the project website. NH has addressed this and people should be receiving emails if they are signed up for notifications.
- Convinced NH to support The Stockbury Observer by purchasing a half page advert every month in order to provide updates to every local household.
- Acquired funding of a Dash-Cam for the Community Bus from NH.
- Ongoing conversations to encourage NH/Graham to support local Stockbury businesses
- Tours of the parish via mini bus with the NH/Graham team to point out roads unsuitable for some vehicles.

Parish Councillors along with a small number of local residents have spent more than 50 hours monitoring various road junctions within the parish in order to determine where the greatest impact caused by the rat running associated with A249 work is being experienced. Consequently, KCC Highways have installed a number of automated vehicle counters and speed recorders to monitor traffic in the most impacted lanes. Further equipment will be installed in alternate locations in the coming weeks.

Meetings with KCC Highways have also been arranged by the PC and multiple faults have been logged via the KCC Highways web site (https://www.kent.gov.uk/roads-andtravel) to address general highways issues. These include nearly 100 pot hole reports and such things as several damaged or missing road signs, fallen trees causing a hazard, worn road markings, fly tipping and empty salt bins. Reporting these issues to KCC Highways is not solely a Parish Council responsibility but can be undertaken by any concerned resident.

Other activities that the Parish Council have been involved in over the past few months includes such things as:

- Working with our MBC Councillor, Patrik Garten, to assist two local residents in making successful applications to be added to the MBC Housing Needs Register. A further 3 local families have been provided with advice on how to submit applications to the Register.
- Planning, financing and co-ordinating of Platinum Jubilee events within the parish.
- Responding directly to the KCC survey with regard to the potential withdrawal of funding for the school bus and

also corresponding with our local MP to bring pressure upon KCC to save this service.

- Reviewing multiple planning applications and making a presentation against the Binbury Park proposal. The PC have also written to the Planning Inspectorate to support a local planning application that MBC had previously refused.
- The PC continue to press the MBC Planning Dept to take enforcement action with regard to breaches of planning applications, following complaints from residents.
- Multiple fly tipping issues have been reported to MBC (https://self.maidstone.gov.uk/service/ report_fly_tipping), most of which are cleared quickly but the PC often needs to encourage MBC to engage with land owners when this issue is not on public land.
- Reported antisocial behaviour within the parish and engaged with Kent Police in order to improve visibility of the police within the parish.
- Applied for and received a substantial donation for the Stockbury Community Bus.

The Parish Council obviously doesn't work in isolation as there are a small number of residents who also actively engage with the local service providers in order to address various parish concerns, particularly with regard to fly tipping, which in turn makes the parish a nicer place to live. The Parish Council are grateful for the active involvement of this small group of parishioners and we would always encourage others to follow their example.

As always, if there are issues that you believe the PC should be aware of, then please either contact the Parish Clerk (details on the back of The Observer) or one of the seven parish councillors (contact details on www.stockbury.org), alternatively, come along to the monthly meeting at the Village Hall.

Meetings are held in Stockbury Village Hall on the third Wednesday of the month from 7.30pm.

Broadband

Just a note to say "thank you" to the new owners of Matts Hill Farm, which is just outside the Parish. For reasons no-one can find out, they decided to switch off the power to the repeater that enabled some of us to use vFast's air fibre broadband. The company were able to reconnect most users via another repeater, but 5 households in Yelsted are now back to using BT's copper wire.

This highlighted a larger issue: some years ago, the Government promised super fast broadband to all households in the UK and gave Openreach (BT) £2 billion of our money to roll it out. It now transpires that Openreach would charge each household wanting a fibre connection around £6,000. This has been raised with Helen Whately who has been in contact with the relevant Minister asking for an explanation. I will let you all know what he/she says ...

A Generous Donation

A few weeks ago we were contacted by the Chairman and Treasurer of the Meopham Welfare Committee advising that their Community Bus Service was in the process of being wound up due to their dwindling



passenger numbers, a consequence of the Covid-19 pandemic, which meant their bus service was no longer viable. Their Charter required that upon winding up, any remaining funds should be distributed to services run on a charitable or not for profit basis.

As we appeared be the only organisation within the county providing a similar service, we were granted a significant part of their funds with other donations being made to The Kent Air Ambulance Service and a couple of local Kent hospices.

Whist its sad to see the demise of the Meopham service which had been running successfully since 1976, we are extremely grateful for their generous donation which will support in running The Stockbury Community Bus for many years to come.

Stockbury Book Club

The Fine Art of Invisible Detection by Robert Goddard

Kazuto Kodaka is a single, solo, old-fashioned private detective working above a shop. His secretary Umiko Wada, a widow, bridges the gap between him and the modern world of computers etc. A rich lady commissions him to find out the truth of her father's "suicide" in 1977 on a business trip to Europe; he is suspected of being a sokoiya (gangster). She places an advertisement in a London evening paper of a photo of the translator (Peter Evans) her father engaged for the trip. She has had no response to this for 27 years and then suddenly receives one.

Ask yourselves is this a Sherlock Holmes or a Comoran Strike detective novel?

As Wada is fluent in English, Kodaka asks her to travel to London to find the mysterious letter writer, a significant change from dealing solely with administration. The case though is so dangerous that Kodaka was killed shortly after Wada left for London.

Peter Ellery (Evans) was a member of a group of four student CND protesters, along with Alison, Martin and Caro, who become aware of a secret government biological research facility in Cornwall. He and Alison break into the site, were detected and on escaping, Alison drowns and Peter is "lost a sea". Marty had driven them there but was drugged by Peter prior to the brake in. Caro was pregnant when this occurred and, unbeknown to Peter, he was the father.

It is a racing plot with a series of strands that twist, turn and overlap exposing Wada to mortal danger by her sokoiya pursuers. This includes visiting Iceland to investigate a private property auction and killing her pursuer then miraculously escaping from a burning building. In Cambridge she escapes by putting a headscarf on and joining some Japanese tourists on a bus tour!

The story ends on a beach in Cornwall near to the government research facility where Alison's body was found, with a hostage exchange that goes off with a bang.

So, it was neither a Sherlock Holmes nor a Comoran Strike. It's a different type of detective novel. An example of "The Fine Art of Invisible Detection" – you will though need to read the novel to discover what this entails.

Overall, the group enjoyed the book more than they expected, despite the fact that some of Wada's escapes would have put James Bond to shame! The multicultural and varied geographic locations added interest and the final twist in the plot created the possibility of a sequel. As is often the case one of us didn't particularly like the novel and questioned its plausibility.

The overall rating was 7/10.

This month we are reading The Nightingale by Kristin Hannah.

Patrik Says ...

MBC Acquire First Site for Delivery of 1,000 Affordable Homes

Cllr David Burton's new executive leadership team has set out the ambition to acquire 1,000 houses under MBC ownership and control, which will be reserved for Maidstone people at affordable rents.

In a great first step to delivering the extra 1,000 affordable homes for Maidstone residents, MBC has just completed the purchase of the former Springfield Library site on Sandling Road.

Being able to provide affordable housing for local people is vital, that's why MBC are pursuing the acquisition of sites to build our own. The secondary benefit of this is that we will tackle sites that are not generally brought forward by the private sector, so we will also achieve regeneration and district improvements at the same time.

More affordable housing in Maidstone for local people is one of the top priorities for the Conservative Leadership Team. We will make sure that those who may not be able to afford to buy or rent privately have the opportunity to live in one of the 1,000 affordable homes we plan to provide.

Residents' Survey

The 2022 Residents' Survey will be launching on Friday 1 July and will run until Monday 29 August. The Survey will ask residents what they really think about Maidstone and the results will impact all of MBC's services; from biodiversity to community safety, from financial inclusion to waste management and more. Road Works

Hardly a community meeting passes by without roadworks and the state of the roads being mentioned.

Firstly I must explain that the District Council (MBC) has NO highways responsibilities whatsoever. As such I have no legal powers to address your concerns. All highways matters fall in the remit of the County Council (KCC).

However, before pointing the finger at my KCC colleague Cllr Prendergast, I also must explain that the M2 Junction 5 improvement works are a national infrastructure project, which is being directed through National Highways (formerly the Highways Agency and later Highways England), which is a government-owned company charged with operating, maintaining and improving motorways and major 'A' roads in England. As such, KCC too has only limited influence here.

Also, as this is a National Highways endeavour, they are exempt from S106 contributions. S106 contributions are only applicable to house-building, as the developer's contribution to counteract the negative impacts of their housing development, often used to improve the road infrastructure. As the junction-works are a national infrastructure improvement, S106 contributions are not applicable.

All is not bad however. National Highways are in regular communication with Stockbury Parish Council to work with the community in order to alleviate the impact of the works on the community.
