I hope you all had a peaceful and blessed Christmas.



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Stockbury Gardeners

Here we go again, another year starting in the garden.

How many of you keep a garden diary? It does work. Making notes on sowing dates and commenting on varieties grown really helps, I can find that each year I can adjust sowing dates to suit weather conditions. Last year I grew parsnips, on the seed packets it said "sow in February" but I know now that parsnips sown in Stockbury do not germinate in February, they just rot in the ground unless you help by covering with a clotch. So a small delay in sowing would have helped!! Oh no, the "Beast from the East" arrived and delayed the sowing even longer the result was late to mature parsnips, that was noted in the diary.

Onion seeds should be emerging in the seed trays ready to transplant to small pots, still keep in a greenhouse though.

Chilli and peppers will need to be sown early in the season as they require a long growth period, sowing at the end of January, you will however require a warm bench or the use of an airing cupboard to germinate the seeds. Place the seeds in a pot of compost lightly covering them with vermiculite, once germinated place all individual seeds into a very small pot. Keep them in the light and keep them warm as they do not like rapid changes of light and warmth. I have had great successes with seeds taken from chillies and peppers, purchased from the supermarket, taking seeds from the fruits and sowing directly without drying them out, after all nature does not bother drying out its seeds!

Prune apples and pears now but not espaliers and cordons as the summer is best for them.

Time now to clean old pots, I have some 10" plastic pots that are over 20 years old and still I use them, real recycling in action!! On the subject of old pots, don't forget any stored outside between the garage and shed need turning over to expose the slug and snail hotels underneath, that way you will feed the thrush and blackbird population. I have my robin following me around again this year, feeding from my hand.

Keep feeding the wild birds, they have come to rely on us now that we have destroyed most of their habitat. Do not burn rubbish piles without first checking for hibernating hedgehogs either.

Most of my family being "long lived", my Grandmother aged nearly 80 sent my Great Grandmother aged 101 and residing in the Isle of Wight some tulip bulbs through the post. Some 6 weeks later my Grandmother received a letter of thanks back saying "thank you for the shallots they were lovely"!!!!

If you struggle with vegetable identification or even bad eyesight, it does not stop you from visiting Stockbury Gardeners to try and avoid the above happening. We meet next on the 7th February at 8 pm in the Village Hall.

Temporary Road Closures

Because of carriageway renewal and resurfacing, Kent County Council has made an Order prohibiting through traffic on A249 Detling Hill, Detling, A229 Blue Bell Hill, Lord Lees and Taddington Woods Roundabouts, Aylesford, between 7 January 2019 and 31 March 2019 or until the works have been completed.

A249 SITTINGBOURNE ROAD/DETLING HILL, DETLING/SITTINGBOURNE ROAD, THURNHAM & STOCKBURY – southbound and northbound closures between M20 junction 7 and M2 junction 5 for 30 nights between 20.00hrs and 06.00hrs

The alternative route is via M20, A229 Blue Bell Hill, Bluebell Hill Slip North Off, Lord Lees Roundabout, Taddington Wood Roundabout, M2 and vice versa.

The alternative route is via M20, A249 Sittingbourne Road/ Detling Road/ Sittingbourne Road, M2 and vice versa.

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Patrik Says

Dear Residents

This month I am pleased to pronounce two big hurrahs:

- 1) Days will get longer and owners of solar panels will soon start to produce electricity again! Yes, I know, they also work in December but in fairness, the electricity they generate at the moment is laughable. A six panel array produces less than three hot cups of tea per day. However, if you are intending to install solar panels and receive money for your produced electricity (there will be lots in the summer), you'll have to pull your socks up, the so called 'Feed-In Tariff' is only available to installations which are completed before 31 March 2019. On a positive note, solar panel have never been as cheap as they are right now.
- 2) Second Hurrah: Maidstone's new Strategic Plan has been approved! Finally! We dwindled the key points down to four! It almost reads like the 2012 Conservative Manifesto:-) NB: we are still the opposition party.

HOUSING

In 2004 MBC took the decision to relinquish all its housing stock and to contract out the provision of housing; that's why most affordable housing is being provided by Golding Homes these days.

The Community and Housing Committee recently took an initial step to reintroduce Council ownership of some housing. It is envisaged to secure £15m pa total over a 5 year period, to acquire new housing stock. This would be a co-investment between the Council and a Registered Provider, each providing funding of £7.5m per annum.

The target will be to achieve a 50% market share of the S106 affordable housing market in Maidstone.

A programme of engagement with Parish Councils will be commenced to gauge the appetite for bringing forward rural exception sites for affordable housing. These would be extra sites for affordable housing, which are not yet marked as development land in the local plan.

It is early days yet and the resolution will have to pass the Policy & Resources Committee, which hold the financial responsibility as well as Full Council However there seems strong support for this idea on both sides of the political spectrum.

I am rather sceptical, for now, and, so far, I voted against this proposal.

I appreciate that this is a difficult issue and I very much welcome your comments.

I am your representative and I will take all opinions forward which reflect my ward's community.

At the committee, I voted against this proposal because, this plan would reverse the 2004 council decision. While the local authority has a statutory duty to ensure adequate housing, currently the provision thereof is entirely in the hands of independent providers. The recent decision means that MBC will reassume the additional burden and cost of becoming a housing provider. Possible failures of commercial partners in this venture would negatively reflect on the Council and tarnish its reputation.

MBC's involvement would only apply to new developments. MBC's responsibility would no longer be clearly defined and confusion in the public perception may occur, in which shortcomings of independent housing providers (eg Golding) may inadvertently also reflect on Maidstone's reputation.

I would much rather prefer the promotion of Co-Op housing schemes within the borough, where residents are in charge of their housing. Co-Ops are generally more efficient than any scheme by large providers whether independent or Local Authority owned.
