Patrik Says

Parking in Maidstone!!

The trouble with January is, that not much interesting happens, at least not interesting enough for me to have another monthly rant... or maybe? YES!! Here is a subject which will steer emotions:

Parking!

Maidstone Borough currently provides over 4,900 car parking spaces in town. That is council owned parking spaces, not counting the private ones, e.g. Fremlin.

Why does the Council charge for parking? Because parking is a valuable service which the Council provides, it is therefore only just to charge for it. – Mmh?… Not my words but I can see some sense in this reasoning.

Across the party political spectrum in Maidstone, it is widely agreed that the Council's parking charges follow roughly the private sector's market valuation of this service; meaning to say that if private parking costs X, then MBC will charge approximately the same or slightly less for their spaces.

Ideally, town planners want as many people as possible in the Town-Centre, which is good for the economy, but as few cars as absolutely necessary because they are bad for the environment. In order to square this circle, we politicians try to play with parking charges; the higher the charges, the lower the amount of cars used. At least this is the theory!

Until 2031 MBC plan to increase their parking charges by 50%.

"Oh shock horror !" I hear you scream. - Taking 13 years' inflation into account and the value which people place on convenience, this 50% increase is expected to only reduce the demand by less than 200 spaces A rather small impact on the town's economy.

In 2015 in Cardigan (Wales) all four ticket machines were vandalised and their council could not afford to repair the machines for three months. Result for the people of Cardigan! Without any parking restrictions in place, people were flocking back to the town centre. Store-owners claim that their sales went up by between 20% and 50% during that time! That is indeed some food for thought. But how can we rid the town of that awful motor-car and still bring happily spending consumers to the shops?

Do I hear anybody mention "Park & Ride"?

Oh what a wonderful idea, one which Maidstone was keen to implement, as one of the very first authorities in the country, many years ago. And since then, a quarter of a million pounds of your taxes were spent year after year on subsidising 900 P&R parking places.

I would not mind trading off my convenience of in-town parking for free P&R. But hold on, the £250,000 does not offer free parking. The cost of subsidised Parking and (Bus) Riding is only marginally lesser than in-town parking and I have to wait for a bus.

Free buses may be abused by people who do not even park, while charging a non-subsidised fee for a P&R bus may make it uneconomical for a car with more than 1 or 2 passengers. Ergo: – charge for Parking and charge for Riding: P&R

Officers did suggest a package to make P&R more attractive by increasing the bus frequency or extending the service time. Unfortunately this would require doubling the subsidy.

This idea, one would assume, took off like a lead balloon. - Not at all! The Liberals (with some help of their Independent friends) embraced the idea, at least the latter part of it, to extend the bus service times.

That is over £400,000 of your council tax to subsidise 900 Pay & Park & Pay again & Ride spaces. (P&R)

Me thinks then, if MBC has so much spare cash to play with, how about building a multi storey car park with 900 FREE spaces in the town centre? At a subsidy of £400k per annum, this car park would be paid for in 13 years' time.

- Ah, silly me, it is stated policy in the Local Plan to reduce traffic in the town centre.

- How could I forget?

I am out of ideas (and page space too!). If you have any magic ideas, you may want to contact Maidstone's Parking Manager – or talk to your Councillor!

Oil Boiler Specialists

A big thank you to all my loyal customers. I have been doing a lot of training and readying my company for the new RHI launch and to this effect we can now offer you biomass boilers (log, pellet and woodchip) and thermal Solar panels.

All design and installs in-house this will allow you to gain the MCS payment from the government to cover the cost of installation.

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Stockbury Gardeners

A quick note to say thanks to drug growers and dealers, NOT for the drugs however but the cost of grow lamps and associated apparatus has enabled the cost of this equipment to be reduced to make the equipment much more affordable to us vegetable and plant growers!!! Insulated bubble wrap, thermometers, heated benches, reflective foil, fans and lamp timers, these all help us get seedlings growing earlier than we would normally and extend our cropping season.

The days are getting longer the birds are pairing up, albeit very early, so its time to get going in the garden.

- Scrub all the old pots and seed trays, use mild washing up liquid.
- Make sure all the glass in the greenhouse is clean.
- Temperatures can reach 30 plus degrees in February so keep an eye on the forecast, and decide before leaving for work, "heating on or off", you could also consider an electric fan to circulate the air to try and avoid plants "damping off"

Turn over old rubbish that you have in between the garage and the shed and greenhouse, this will expose once again snails for the thrush's and blackbirds. Keep on feeding the birds and out of interest note down how many of each variety, its amazing how the populations change with a little help from humans. Habitat can also be created, there is always space for more bird boxes and shelves can be put up near the top of open lean to's and place old bits of wood to fill the shelves you will find wrens and robins will nest there, quite close to humans. When clearing out old rubbish in the wood stores and sheds be aware that butterflies can be hibernating so try not to disturb them.

This month sow the following:

- If you have a lot of patience Asparagus seed can be sown or 1-year crowns planted, expect a harvest 2/3 year on but treat the King of vegetables as a 20-year investment.
- Broad beans can be sown in an old gutter inside a warm greenhouse, and then moved out side after hardening off and planted in the ground.
- Early sowing of carrots can be made and half of the row could be covered with a cloche to spread the season.
- Shallots can be started in pots if you did not plant earlier in the garden, so you can catch up.
- Tomatoes can be sown in a greenhouse.
- Chillies and sweet pepper need to be sown early in February, I find them hard to germinate but a good trick is to place a small seed tray inside a polythene sandwich zip loc bag. Simply use a half size seed tray dampen the general-purpose compost and drop seeds on the surface, cover with Vermiculite (do not water vermiculite). When seedlings germinate after about 20 days on a warm windowsill, prick out into small pots.
- Not too soon to sow any brassica seeds, cauliflower, cabbage. broccoli, brussel sprouts etc.
- Sweet peas should have been sown in November but February is still OK.
- Nearly forgot to say about leek seeds sow now, see picture!! (They're very impressive Chris! - Ed)

If you do nothing else this month, join us at the Gardeners meeting on the 1^{st} February at 8 pm.

Little Owl

We were recently approached by a student from Canterbury University, Charlie Russell, who is carrying out a study of Little Owls in Kent, a species which has suffered a 65% population decline nationwide in the last 25 years.

This project aims to support the Little Owls in Kent, providing them suitable nesting boxes to bolster their population within the county. As part of the project, Little Owls in this scheme will be monitored, alongside the land they live on, to help identify the cause/s for their decline. The project will raise awareness of the Little Owl amongst the public as well as working with orchards and other agricultural areas to encourage sustainable practices for their benefit in our county.

Fortunately Charlie heard of us and has now put up 2 Little Owl boxes in the Cherry Orchard on Church Lane. The boxes are about 40 cm cubed, painted black and in 2 of the old trees

Identification

The little owl is about 22 cm tall with a wing span of 56 cm, mottled brown and white underparts and upperparts with a narrow brownish face, pale yellow eyes and dark irises. The overall impression in flight of a smallish brown bird. Its call is a falsetto "kee-ew" quite short in length and then repeated.



If you see or hear a little owl in the orchard and especially if you see one in a nesting box, please let me know.

During December amidst our usual Christmas festivities, we reviewed "*Truly, Madly, Guilty*" by *Liane Moriarty.*

This Australian author may already be familiar to some of you as she has written several very popular novels.

The plot centres on three couples, one of whom hosts a BBQ and much of the plot unfolds from that. An unexplained death and a collapsing marriage give some depth to the plot but most people found the first half of the book was pretty tedious and you spend all the time waiting for something to happen! However I am pleased and relieved to report that it did improve substantially and became quite a page turner, with lots of anticipation making you want to get to the end.

Personally I think it would make a good holiday read – but that time of year feels something of a long time off at the moment.

However, book reviewing always takes last place on our Christmas get together. Mulled wine, good food and company always puts us in a good mood for our film viewing, which this year was "A Street Cat Named Bob". As you may remember we read the book earlier in the year and its about a homeless drug addict who is 'adopted' by a cat who he names Bob. True to the book, it was a very enjoyable film.

The title of our January read was **Moon Tiger** by Penelope Lively. This is a fairly short book which was written in1987 and which won the Booker Prize that year.

The central character is Claudia, an elderly historian who imagines that she is going to write a history of the world. The story she tells however focuses on aspects of her own life history and memories.

She was a strong, independent and brave woman and we learn about her relationships with her mother, brother and daughter but the part we all really enjoyed was when she relates her experiences in Egypt during World War II. Claudia was a war journalist and the book has some wonderful visual phrases which convey the atmosphere of the desert and the war which raged there.

The general comment was that it took a while to get into the story but after the first 30 pages or so we were all hooked and wanted to read on. T he language is quite complex and we needed to concentrate but it was well worth the effort.

We gave this book a high score of 8.5 out of 10.

Next month we are reading a crime novel, **The Dry** by Jane Harper.


